FBRP needs you. The Black Run Preserve exists because so many people care about our unique piece of Pine Barrens, enjoy accessing its beauty for recreation, and want more trails and events. Happy Trails

The Pine Barrens ecosystem is fire prone, therefore most of the flora is fire adapted except for the oak trees. If it wasn't for fire,

this ecosystem would be the "oak barrens". It had been over 50 years since the last wildfire in the BRP area, allowing a heavy fuel load of flammable "duff" to accumulate on the forest floor. Combined with the threat of illegal camp fires being made in various parts of the preserve, it's been FBRP's long held concern that a wildfire started accidentally would threaten our neighbors in

King's Grant and along Hopewell Road.

Partnering with Evesham Township officials, Evesham Fire Department, Public Works, and the NJ Forest Fire Service, a "prescribed burn"

> was conducted to reduce the fuel load and the risk of wildfire. Trail **Crew** volunteers helped prep the area for a more efficient burn, which was carried out during perfect weather conditions in mid March. Following the burn, Trail Crew members then installed trail signage, five benches, six new educational signs, and signs identifying all of our bogs. In addition, our Trail Crew volunteers maintain our trails all year long and conduct multiple cleanups in coordination with Evesham Township's Clean Communities Program.



New 5K Route

If you've been a long-time BRP visitor, then you know the local beaver clan has made a major impact upon our trails adjacent to the bogs. In particular, their handiwork has flooded our original 5K route which began and finished at the Kettle Run Road East Trailhead. Therefore, that route has been closed and a new 5K route established in the uplands area starting and ending at the Borton's Road Trailhead. This new route provides a dry path for trail runners. Look for registration info this spring for our annual 5k Race on Sunday, April 26, 2020.

Evesham Police Department

Evesham Schools

Thanks to an anonymous donation for educational outreach made in honor of Lynne Pugh, wife of a very active member, Ron Pugh, FBRP is pleased to announce a new partnership project with Evesham Schools, offering a unique art contest for middle school students titled, "People of the Pines. People of Peace." Education is one of FBRP's mission objectives, so this donation made our next project possible. BRP visitors will learn about Evesham's Quaker heritage and its cultural influence upon the region and America. Winning artwork will be on permanent display in the BRP starting June 6, 2020. BRP is for the Birds!

The Black Run is host to many bird species, and FBRP has been monitoring the nesting success of some of them since 2015. In fact, you may have noticed nest boxes placed strategically around the preserve (please don't approach them!), which are intended to provide increased nesting habitat. Volunteers in the Black Run Preserve's NestWatch Project monitor these nests throughout the spring and summer, recording the number of eggs laid, nestlings hatched, and fledglings that have flown the nest. This data is then submitted to the University of Cornell's NestWatch Program, a nationwide monitoring program designed to track status and trends in the reproductive biology of birds, including changes over time as a result of pressures from invasive species, climate change, and habitat loss. Natural nests can be monitored by citizen scientists too, but in the Black Run we report strictly on the birds that use our boxes. This year in our 34 nest sites, we recorded 14 nest attempts by 3 species of birds, 66 eggs laid, 58 young hatched, and 52 total fledglings. Tree swallows led the way with the most eggs laid and babies successfully fledged (20), followed by chickadees (14), and bluebirds (9). These birds are all species that would normally nest in dead trees where competition for nesting cavities is fierce, so this is a great example of how providing habitat increases productivity. Build it and they will come!

Special thanks to Project NestWatch co-chairs Jeff Jackson and Doug Wallner, and volunteer Steve McGeady, for all their hard work monitoring our nest boxes this past season. If you love the Black Run Preserve and have ever wanted to get more involved, there's no time like the present. We have big plans coming up for re-locating some of our nest boxes to attract more bird species and improve the preserve's nesting results. We are also in need of citizen scientists to help monitor nests. Participating in Project Nest-Watch is fun, educational, and easy - just about anyone can do it. Volunteers visit nest boxes every 4-5 days and record their observations. If you would like to volunteer to either help relocate nest boxes this fall and winter, or sign up for training to monitor nests next spring, please email (admin@blackrun.org) for more information.
